

We opened our third residential home in Markham, expanded our iGrad program, a program geared towards helping young people graduate high school, grew our HOPE program which provides supports for survivors of human trafficking, and expanded our Nightstop program, which offers youth the opportunity to stay at a host family's house. We also moved into new, much larger office space allowing our teams to work more efficiently together under one roof. That's why your support of

You also provide the chance to show marginalized youth that their dreams, hopes and lives matter and that they can move to a more meaningful life and independent living from any circumstance.

Message from the Chief Executive Officer

In 2019, we are so proud to be able to celebrate 30 years of this incredible organization delivering services to homeless young people throughout York Region. Our organizational journey began with a bold question in the auditorium of a high school in Markham: "How many of you know a young person who is homeless?" Over 100 homeless young people were identified and, as the saying goes, the rest is history.

Now, 30 years later, we see the importance of prevention – addressing the issues and systems that cause homelessness rather than intervening only after homelessness has occurred. Research has consistently shown that homelessness amongst young people is a leading factor in adult homelessness and most youth experience homelessness prior to their 15th birthday. Clearly, preventing homelessness needs to be a priority. Driven by this reality, we launched the York Region Youth Strategy, thanks to a 3 year grant from the United Way. We expect that the collaboration that is being convened through this initiative amongst a variety of partners will result in a York Region with better aligned services ensuring that at-risk youth get early supports to reduce their likelihood of becoming homeless.

One of our key strategic priorities at 360°kids is on delivering effective programs for youth. Over the past year we strengthened our focus on program evaluation, training on restorative practices using a trauma informed lens and becoming a Naloxone distribution site to better support youth with addictions.

Our second priority is on strengthening the financial and human resources capacity of our organization. We have been accomplishing this through better use of technology and more integrated platforms such as with the implementation of the Dayforce system, which has created efficiencies in both finance and HR and, excitingly, moving us forward from our manual systems. This past year, we implemented the second phase of our Job Evaluation process and rolled out our Total Rewards Compensation Plan. These are all very important initiatives that will help us in our efforts to truly be an Employer of Choice.

Raising awareness about youth homelessness and the work of 360°kids is another of our strategic priorities – to enable us to sustain our work going forward. This past year, we updated our website giving us a brand new look and helping us better tell our story. We also executed very successful fundraising events encouraged by the donation funds and supplies provided by the many individuals and corporations throughout the York Region community. Partnerships are key to our success and was exemplified quite strongly with the opening of our Mill St. residence. It was the coming together of the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, The Home Depot Foundation, Hockey Helps the Homeless and a committed group of volunteers. The result was more affordable housing spaces for young people transitioning towards greater independence. Such collaborations will be a key to our success going forward.

We are ever so grateful for the ongoing support from the York Region community for the past 30 years. You are the difference in helping us let young people know that they really do matter!



1. Sometimes the best holiday present is presence...

Throughout her life, Angel was raised in a devout Catholic home and began experiencing conflict with her parents when she chose to identify and later transition to the Islamic faith. The conflict she experienced in her family life took a toll on Angel's mental health as she went to live with a close friend during her time of uncertainty as a way to seek refuge from her problems. Although her decision to live outside the home was made out of the belief that she would be accepted, comforted and understood she later learned through the experience that her new environment was exacerbating her mental health condition as a result of feeling more judged, rejected and misunderstood. Angel was referred to the Nightstop program by a 360°kids counsellor in November of 2018 and accessed services directly from the Markham Stouffville Hospital, where she was self-admitted after seeking mental health supports.

Angel used the Nightstop Program from November 2018 to December 2018 and spent a total of 36 bed nights at a Nightstop family home where she developed meaningful relationships with this family. The relationships developed with her host family were so positive that the family wished they could host Angel long-term. While accessing the Nightstop Program, she continued to persevere and regularly attend classes to complete her post-secondary education in Early Childhood Education at George Brown College. During her stay with Nightstop, she continued to maintain a close relationship with her sister who was still living at home with her biological family and was able to take the time and space needed away to positively rebuild her relationship while implementing healthy boundaries.

The Nightstop Program provided Angel with an opportunity to have a safe space while she worked on understanding how to have healthy interaction with her parents and also allowed for more two-way communication to occur. While accessing Nightstop, Angel was able to use the time away from home to mend her relationship with her parents, allowing her to feel supported enough to make the conscious decision to move back home just in time for the holidays.

"Base 4 Success helped me learn a lot about the safety of working and going after what I want in life. It taught me the basics of CPR and I learned about health and safety in a kitchen. After the classes I got a job interview the same week and I kept the job ever since then. I've been working and I love where I work I believe this is an opportunity to get my life back on track." - O.G

2. A young man by the name of *Steve was sent by his parents to Canada in hopes for a better life...

The distance from his family was isolating, he had no connection with his cultural community and received no financial support from his family. As a result of a series of unfortunate circumstances, he was forced to drop out of school. After joining the Every Bite Matters program, staff were able to enroll Steve in the iGrad program where he was able to successfully achieve his credits and work towards completing his high school diploma. He was also connected with a housing worker in hopes of getting support with finding a more suitable place to live, as he was often found couch-surfing in a shared apartment. Steve found that Every Bite Matters was more than an employment program, it was also a gateway to resources and supports that he may not otherwise had access to, or even know he needed.

"I think the STEP program is great. They really support you with your mental health and give you the necessary skills and coping mechanisms to get employment. I would definitely recommend this employment program to other people. My counsellor was phenomenal with teaching me new skills and increasing my knowledge to get back into the work force" - N.D.



3. Overcoming a 'ruff' time with the help from Base 4 Success...

*Sally Lee was referred to Base for Success by her caseworker at a developmental services agency who advised that Sally had been seeking employment for some time but to-date was unsuccessful, having completed a number of placement opportunities through school and other programs but was not able to reach her goal. Sally entered B4S in April and through various conversations with a 360°kids Job Developer determined a plan of action of how to proceed. It was established that a job either working directly with or related to animals is where she would most thrive. Together, Sally and her Job Developer actively sought employment in the community, meeting with employers and attending several interviews.

The duo experienced some setbacks and eventually after many attempts, the decision was made to place her file on hold with Service Canada to trouble shoot, while earmarking a placement opportunity for her for when she was 'ready'. They continued to seek opportunities and were finally able to find an employer that was willing to mentor her at Pet Chateau as a dog daycare attendant! This is a position that Sally dreamed about and was elated when she found out she could start.


4. Employee Testimonial: Housing Worker...

It is not uncommon to find that living accommodations and renting options in York Region are scarce and often do not cater to our youth who are on fixed or lower income budgets, which can be very challenging for them to navigate alone. One of the biggest barriers I have faced as a Housing Worker dealing with the youth and agencies alike is that they often believe there is a magic solution to accessing a selection of affordable, available housing in the Region. Many of our youth receive government assistance and are very transparent about their decision to not go back to school or find a job. In my role as a Housing Worker, I have found that the youth can sometimes have idealistic views about their options for comfortable living while being on a small income. The harsh reality of the truth of the situation can often be difficult for many youth to accept. However, despite this, many of them are excited to live in our programs and begin the intake process. Many are able to gain the life skills they need to slowly move towards independent living.



Mill St. GRAND Opening



The Transitions program sources affordable market rent, community based units across York Region to provide longer term transitional housing for youth. 360°kids firmly believes that youth deserve the opportunity to live in a safe, peaceful, and caring environment where they can get the support they need.

While residing in the Transitions program, youth pay an affordable licensee fee which is incrementally increased over a 3 year term, bringing them closer to market rent prices. Consequently, by the end of the 3 years, participants would have improved their economic situation, making market rent more achievable. This would then allow them the opportunity to take over the lease with the landlord or find alternate rental accommodations in the community. While participating in Transitions, youth are supported by a mentor. This person is there to assist them with goal setting and achievement, problem solving and overall, to help them accomplish success. This program will build on the skills youth currently have and assist them in becoming successful as they continue on with their life's journey.

360°kids provides a variety of affordable housing options for vulnerable youth with the latest being the Mill St. house. This incredible opportunity has been made possible through our partnership with the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA), the Home Depot Canada Foundation and Hockey Helps The Homeless.

Since 2009, Hockey Helps the Homeless has been a proud supporter of 360°kids.

Over the past decade, proceeds raised from our York Region tournaments have been used to support the 360°kids Transitions Program which helps acquire and provide affordable housing for homeless or atrisk youth. Through this initiative, Hockey Helps The Homeless and 360°kids have been able to give youth in-need the chance to find a safe place to call home and lead a healthy, happy and productive life.

As Hockey Helps The Homeless enters into its 10th year in partnership with 360°kids, we are proud to say that our tournament contributions will surpass the \$1 million mark. Since being established 30 years ago, 360°kids has played a significant role in facing-off against youth homeless in their community. We are thrilled to support the incredible work being done and cannot wait to see how they continue to change the lives of young people in York Region who need it most.



On February 7, 2016, I suddenly lost my beloved son, Gianluca, at the young age of twenty-two Gianluca was a gentle soul with an adventurous spirit whose compassion and kindness touched and inspired everyone he knew. Gianluca was passionate about social VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR – JOANNA LIOKOSSIS

justice issues and was about to join local law enforcement in the hopes of making a difference in the lives of those in his community, especially those who are disadvantaged.

The first Christmas that we were without Gianluca we wanted to make a donation in his name, since we could no longer give him a gift. 360°kids immediately came to mind, as I had previously heard about the work they do with at-risk youth in York Region. As a police officer,

Gianluca would have undoubtedly worked to support and assist these individuals, and so it seemed meant to be that we would contribute to this organization on Gianluca's behalf.

Shortly after Christmas, as we approached the first year anniversary of Gianluca's passing, two of his friends approached us with a proposal to create a non-profit in Gianluca's honour. It's mission would be to support at-risk and underprivileged youth and provide them with the opportunity to take part in experiences that would help positively shape their character and development. It was decided that the first fundraising event would be a softball tournament, since Gianluca was supposed to join a softball league with friends the summer after his passing. I suggested that the proceeds from our fundraising efforts be used to support 360°kids.

In meeting with Lesley and the team at 360°kids, the idea of a camp experience that included life skills development was suggested as a program that our fundraising efforts could support. The idea was a perfect fit to honour Gianluca, as he thrived when he was outdoors, while providing other youth with an opportunity that otherwise might not have been accessible. The Gianluca's Northern Camp Adventure program was established.

After the softball tournament, I was inspired to continue working with 360°kids because I strongly felt that Gianluca would have wanted me to continue supporting a worthy organization. In a sense, I was giving back to the youth of my community on his behalf. I would do anything to have my son back and it broke my heart to know that so many young people are ignored or practically thrown away by their families. This year I decided it would be wonderful to work closer with the youth who visit "the Hub" I was provided with the opportunity to assist with the essentials (such as preparing food in the kitchen and organizing clothes) - something that I could no longer do for Gianluca. It is my hope that by continuing to volunteer on Gianluca's behalf, I will be able to continue his legacy and share with others the story of what a wonderful human being he was.






